



Developmental Disabilities Program

The MH/DD Program oversees the Berks County Developmental Disabilities Program. This program promotes opportunities for individuals with disabilities to lead full and productive lives within our community. It is our goal to ensure that services and supports are provided to meet the needs of consumers with intellectual disabilities in the least restrictive setting possible. We want all individuals whom we serve to be active members of our community and live a life of quality.

The Developmental Disabilities Program was awarded additional Waiver capacity through the Department of Human Services, Office of Developmental Programs. This resulted in Berks County receiving:

- 13 Consolidated Waiver
- 85 Community Living Waiver

This brings the grand total of consumers receiving Waiver services in Berks County to:

- 576 Consolidated Waiver
- 296 Community Living Waiver
- 453 Person/Family Directed Supports



Early Intervention Program



The early intervention program helps families with the development of their children, ages from birth to three years of age, who have special needs due to developmental delays, disabilities or special risk factors.

Early Intervention Program

Coaching Initiative from OCDEL

Pennsylvania's Early Intervention (EI) program has been promoting coaching supports and services and collaborative partnerships for infants, toddlers and preschool children with disabilities and their families, caregivers, and early childhood education (ECE) professionals.

Coaching is designed to promote sustainable growth in knowledge, skills and behaviors for an individual or group. The focus when coaching a parent is observation, instruction and reflection so professionals, families and caregivers can use evidence-based practices for the development of young children in everyday activities and routines.

7/1/23 - 6/30/24 Berks County Activities:

- The Berks County Core Leadership Team, established to guide and monitor the implementation of the coaching initiative, met regularly to continue leading and providing supports necessary to EI staff.
- El staff continued to work through the Infant Toddler Service Delivery Learning Path developed for the coaching initiative. These courses have been identified as the foundational knowledge pieces to implementing the new practice.
- Berks Early Care and Education Council Annual Retreat 9/8/23
 - o Presentation Title: Early Intervention Service Delivery Coaching Across Settings
 o Session Summary: This presentation outlined the key features of how this new approach has been rolling out over the past several years and the role of administrators, service providers, families, and community partners in this process. Homebased Coaching, the service delivery method for Early Intervention Birth to Age Three, Embedded Instruction for Early Learning, and the approach for Preschool Early Intervention were described. The importance of collaborative efforts among Early Intervention and Early Childhood professionals and the families they serve was highlighted. Participants learned more about how these service delivery models support caregivers to take the lead supporting their children in meaningful, everyday routines in home, early care and education and the community.

o Number of participants: 80

- Mailing to Pediatricians 5/15/24
 - Mailing conducted to 55 local pediatricians regarding Early Intervention and to promote community "buy-in" for using the new coaching model.

Homeless Assistance Program (HAP) funds rental assistance to allow individuals to remain housed. These funds also provide care management for an array of housing service providers as well as Bridge Housing for individuals and families.

Human Service Development Fund (HSDF) assists in the following: Meals on Wheels for people under 60 years of age, school prevention services, case management, and a forensic interviewer for children.

The Berks County Administrative Entity spent time in the 23/24 fiscal year, enhancing efforts to create networking activities for families, and resources for those with intellectual disabilities and/or autism. Through the *Berks County Supporting Families Collaborative*, an exciting event was held on June 29th at Bern Farm in Reading. It was "A Summer Luau" and featured the Solo Expression Dance Co. Everyone dressed in their best luau gear for this day provided fun, socialization, refreshments, and an awesome dance experience. As you can see from the photos, those in attendance had the most amazing time!





The Berks County Supporting Families Collaborative continues to develop, expand membership and connect with community partners. The focus of their work is the core belief that "all people have the right to live, love, play and pursue their own life aspirations in the community".



HealthChoices Program




HealthChoices is Pennsylvania's mandatory managed care program for Medical Assistance (MA) consumers. The program is designed to improve access to and the quality of care for MA consumers throughout Pennsylvania.

The PA Department of Human Services (DHS) has contracted directly with Berks County to manage the HealthChoices behavioral healthcare services to county residents since October 2001. The County, in turn, sub-contracts with a managed care organization (MCO), Community Care Behavioral Health (CCBH), to manage behavioral healthcare services on behalf of the County HealthChoices Program. The MCO's responsibilities include provider network development, utilization management, quality management, claims management, information systems, reporting, member services, preventative and outreach.

NEW Mental Health Diversion



Purpose: Assess, divert from emergency department (ED) or inpatient psychiatric care, and link to community-based services. For all ages.

Integrated Community Wellness Center (ICWC) at Tower Health Reading Hospital ED 75% diversion rate

KidsPeace Walk-in Assessment Center 83% diversion rate

Crisis Intervention Team training for First Responders began this year with two 40hour trainings.

High-Risk Population

Berks County Suicide Prevention Grant

In collaboration with Penn State Pro Wellness and the Berks County ruOK Task Force, the Department of Health awarded funding to provide evidence-based training and infrastructure development regarding suicide prevention and intervention for Berks County teens and young adults.

During 2023-2024, Cohort 1 schools, consisting of Wyomissing and Brandywine Heights completed a mental health assessment for their schools. All sophomore students are being trained in Teen Mental Health First Aide. In addition, ten percent of the educators for that grade are receiving training in Youth Mental Health first aid.

Additional partners include Berks Counseling Center and the Berks County Intermediate Unit (BCIU). Their staff have become certified to provide the training for students and staff.
